


COVERING THE MIRACLE OF MODERN MEDICINE

Documenting the wonders, emotions, and interactions that occur as health professionals strive to save lives daily is anything but routine. The operating theatre is not for a newcomer or someone trying to figure out the camera settings during open-heart surgery, but well-suited for someone of Joe McNally's caliber.

McNally has taken his cameras and his sensibilities into operating rooms, birthing suites, patient examination rooms, ICU's, ambulance command centers, nursing stations, diagnostic labs and classrooms, faithfully observing and documenting the day-to-day drama and the marvel of medical and scientific innovations.

Technically Excellent

Excellence in camera work, lighting, and a skilled eye that knows how to find a picture in the often drab hallways of a hospital are all key. Medical jobs demand an intuitive ability to know when to step forward and when to stay in the background. McNally knows how to feel the heartbeat of a coverage.

Versatility and Visual Creativeness

An effective photographer telling the story of a hospital must know that a hospital is not brick and mortar, and medical teams are not most effectively pictured standing together in a smiling group in a hallway.
